Upper Fort Garry Heritage Park

Only a gate and a small section of wall remains of this once-bustling Hudson's Bay Company trading post where the Manitoba government was born. In 1869 the newly formed Canadian government purchased the rights to what was then known as "Rupert's Land" and what we'd call "everything west of Ontario." The one problem is no one informed the people who lived there.

As the year dragged on and the official date of title transfer grew closer, tensions worsened. Surveyors from Ontario came and began assessing land, ignoring the current residents. The appointed governor, and his rhetoric of "rescuing" the Canadian West from "the control of a foreign race, and of a religion which is not the religion of the Empire" alarmed many. Eventually a provisional government, organized by anglophone and francophone Métis communities, formed and Louis Riel emerged as a leader.

A group in favour of the colonial policy planned to attack the provisional government. They were arrested but one, Thomas Scott, who had not been at the meeting, publicly confronted Riel and demanded they be freed. When Riel refused Scott began a racist tirade, continuing to threaten Riel after he was arrested. Scott later escaped with some allies, returning to Fort Garry with a large armed mob, only to find the remaining prisoners were freed. Scott was arrested again, but continued to threaten the provisional government and assaulted his guards, culminating in his execution by firing squad after being tried for treason and insubordination. Local legend has it the remaining gate is the one he was shot at.

Upper Fort Garry Park is at Broadway and Main streets, near the Forks and the River Walk.

There is a statue of Louis Riel on the grounds of the Manitoba Legislature, facing the river.
