Saving the Bison

Once over a thirty million bison roamed the prairies of North America. Written records from Manitoba's early history describe herds that took entire days to fall out of sight. An animal of absolutely vital ecological, material, and spiritual importance, bison began to be deliberately killed off in huge numbers in the 1830s to starve the First Nations peoples that relied on them.

American General Phil Sheridan allegedly said, in 1873, "Let them kill, skin, and sell until the buffalo is exterminated. It is the only way to bring a lasting peace and to allow civilization to advance." Meanwhile, in the newly formed province of Manitoba, steps were already being taken to prevent this. Métis community leader James McKay – who helped negotiate Treaties 1-3, 5, and 6 – was then serving on the provincial government, working uphill to address the growing food insecurity of Manitoba's First Nations.

In that same year, Charlie Alloway – a military veteran who had come to Winnipeg under the command of General Wolseley – took over his brother's veterinary practice and opened a trading post, purchasing 21,000 bison hides in a single day from a single brigade.

Unlikely allies, McKay and Alloway would undertake several expeditions to round up wild bison for the purpose of conservation. Some members of this herd would go on to help save the species in Banff and Montana, while others would be among the first animals at the Assiniboine Park Zoo. Descendants of that herd continue to live at the zoo to this day.
